A Success Story: Rebuilding Trust to Support a Child's Return to Learning

A child with persistent absence was referred to the School Attendance Support Team after missing over a quarter of the academic year. The father had disengaged from school, declined all support, and was hostile in communication. Previous attempts to support had not been engaged with. Working with the Attendance Officer, the school adopted a tailored approach, arranging a phone-based meeting to accommodate the father's needs. This opened the door to constructive dialogue. The father agreed to pastoral and



learning support for the child, signed an Attendance Contract, and gave permission for a medical plan to be developed. Communication between home and school was restored, and Children's Services are now involved. The child is receiving the support they need, and adults around them are working together to improve their school experience.

The Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) podcast episode "Supporting School Attendance: Reflection and Planning Tool" explores evidence-based strategies to improve pupil attendance. Although shared over a year ago, it remains highly relevant.

Carter highlights the importance of using data and research to understand attendance challenges:

Sense of Belonging – A critical factor across all contexts, linked to pupils feeling respected and safe, both physically and emotionally. This is particularly significant for female pupils.

Second Transition (Year 7 to Year 8) – A period where attendance often dips.

Intersectionality – For example, girls eligible for Pupil Premium and identified as SEN had an average attendance of just 77%.

Owen also notes that rewards and sanctions have limited impact compared to fostering strong relationships and helping pupils understand the value of attendance.
